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Samuel Beckett S Endgame 1957

Endgame, by Samuel Beckett, is a one-act play with four characters. It was originally written in French; Beckett himself translated it into English. The play was first performed in a French-language production at the Royal Court Theatre in London, opening on 3 April 1957. The follow-up to *Waiting for Godot*, it is commonly considered to be among Beckett's best works.

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Hamm, the master, who is blind, wheelchair-bound, and demanding; Clov, his resentful servant, physically incapable of sitting down; and Hamm's crippled, senile parents, Nagg and Nell, confined to garbage cans.

Endgame is a one-act play by Nobel Prize-winning Irish playwright Samuel Beckett. Considered a masterpiece of modernist absurdity, *Endgame* was originally written in French and had its world premiere at London's Royal Court Theatre in 1957. It tells the story of four distinctive characters confined to a single room as they try to make sense of life in the aftermath of an unidentified apocalyptic disaster.

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Endgame is considered, alongside *Godot*, Beckett's theatrical masterpiece. It was first performed in London on April 3, 1957, in French under the less catchy title *Fin de partie*; Beckett wrote much of his work in French, later translating it into English, under the assumption that writing in a foreign tongue would force linguistic discipline.
